‘বাংলা ভাষা ও সাহিত্য’ শিরোনামের বড়্যমাণ কোর্সটি প্রণয়নের উদ্দেশ্য স্নাতক (সম্মান) শ্রেণির ইংরেজি বিষয়ের শিড়ার্থীদের বাংলা ভাষা ও সাহিত্যের ইতিহাস সম্পর্কে প্রয়োজনীয় ধারণা দেওয়া, বিভিন্ন কাজে বাংলা ভাষা ব্যবহারে দড়তা বৃদ্ধি করা এবং বাংলা সাহিত্যের প্রতি আগ্রহ জাগিয়ে তোলা। ভাষিক যোগাযোগের উদ্দেশ্যে নির্ভুল ও প্রমিত নিয়মে বাংলা লিখন, শুদ্ধ উচ্চারণে বাচনিক অনুশীলন আয়ত্ত করা এবং শিড়ার্থীদের মধ্যে সাহিত্যবোধ জাগ্রত করার পাশাপাশি তাদের উদাবনী ও সৃজনীশক্তির প্রায়োগিক উৎকর্ষ সাধন করাও এই কোর্স প্রণয়নের অন্যতম উদ্দেশ্য। এর মাধ্যমে বাঙালির শিকড়ের সংস্কৃতিকে ধারণ করে শিড়ার্থীরা ভবিষ্যতের চ্যালেঞ্জ মোকাবিলায় স্বদেশপ্রেমের চেতনায় উজ্জীবিত হয়ে জ্ঞান, দড়তা, মানবিক মূল্যবোধ ও ইতিবাচক দৃষ্টিভঙ্গিসম্পন্ন সনাগরিক হিসেবে জাতির বৃহত্তর কল্যাণে অবদান রাখবে।
